ACADEMIC REVIEW

The faculty and administration are very concerned when a student earns below a **C-** in any subject. Academic Review is intended as a positive effort to help the student make progress toward successful completion of coursework. It is our goal to assist students in acquiring the attitude, knowledge, and skills that contribute to effective learning in school and across the life span.

Students, parents, and faculty will work together in this monitoring process, designed to help students making a **D** or an **F** in a course or courses for a nine-week period and/or a semester.

Process:

1. The Academic Review Committee reviews students' academic needs when making a **D** or an **F** at the mid-marking period.
2. At the mid-marking period, notification of recommendations and requirements is sent to the family. The student may be required to have a conference with the teacher, counselor, dean, and/or parents.

Early Arrivals and Early Morning Care

Students who arrive before the designated arrival times are to report to the Dining Hall.

Early morning care for Grades PK – 8 is free and begins at 7 a.m. in the Dining Hall.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT PHILOSOPHY

The coaching staff of St. Agnes Academy – St. Dominic School has dedicated itself to the development of the total student athlete. Both the physical and psychological growth of each person is conscientiously considered when planning and implementing the athletic program.

The professional staff is aware of the individual needs of its youth as well as the social implications of being able to work as a member of a team. Students will be given the opportunity through extensive training, excellent equipment, and good coaching to reach their maximum potential athletically if they dedicate themselves to the program.

The School's goal is to produce young people who have the capacity to be successful citizens in our highly competitive society. We are committed to achieve this goal. When students leave St. Agnes Academy – St. Dominic School, we want them to be able to say that they were proud to have been a part of St. Agnes Academy – St. Dominic School athletics.

ATTENDANCE

Both parents and students should be aware of the strong relationship between good attendance and success in school. Particular attention should be paid to the list of holidays and vacation periods found in the school calendar. St. Agnes Academy – St. Dominic School expects that students and their families will honor these dates and expect no special vacation privileges.

Whenever a student must be absent from school, a **parent or guardian must call the office before 9:00 A.M. in order to inform us of the reason for his/her absence. Upon her/his return to school, the student must bring a written note signed by a parent stating the reason for the absence. Unless prior arrangements have been made with the appropriate Dean by 9:00 AM of the day of absence, students who miss school for even part of a day are not permitted to participate in any after school function scheduled for that day.**

Early Dismissal

Written requests for early dismissal must be submitted to and approved by the Dean prior to the dismissal. Students who are dismissed early are ineligible for perfect attendance.

Excused Absences

A student may receive an excused absence for these reasons:

1. **Personal Illness**, as well as serious illness or death of someone in the immediate family.
2. **Funerals** – Ordinarily, students will be excused to attend funerals of family members only. Parents should send a written request to the Dean on these occasions.
3. **Appointments** – Only medical or dental appointments of an emergency nature will be allowed as excused absences. Students are expected to make orthodontist appointments out of class time whenever possible. A good time for medical examinations is Wednesday afternoons since the schools have early dismissal.
4. **Exceptional Cases** – An excused absence for a whole or a portion of a day may be given for unusual or exceptional occasions after consultation with and **written approval from the respective Dean**. To arrange an absence, parents are to contact the Dean either by email or by sending a note with their child. Requests for an arranged absence must be made as soon as it is known that the student will need to be absent.

Unexcused Absences

A student who is absent for reasons other than those listed above and who has not made prior arrangements with the appropriate school officials is considered to be truant. This is a major disciplinary offense. The student will not be allowed to make up missed class work or tests, and he/she may be suspended from classes for a period of time considered justified by the Dean.

Illness at School

A student who becomes ill at school should request permission from his/her teacher to report to the School Nurse. If the illness is serious, the School Nurse will have the secretary notify the parents. If a K-8 student must leave school during the day, the secretary will release her/him from school to the parents, guardian, or parent-designated responsible person.

Tardies

Students arriving after 8:00 A.M. will be considered tardy. If a pattern of tardiness develops, the school will contact the parents and student. Appropriate consequences for excessive tardies may be administered. A student who has more than four (4) tardies a year is ineligible for perfect attendance.

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BACKPACK

Do to limited space and the size of the school lockers, all types of backpacks, rolling or shoulder, may be no larger than 11.5” wide X 10.5” deep.

BULLYING

St. Agnes Academy- St. Dominic School defines *bullying* as follows:

Bullying happens when someone with more power unfairly hurts someone with less power over and over again. Power may be physical strength, social skill, verbal ability, or other resource.

Consequences for bullying are outlined in the St. Agnes Academy-St. Dominic School Peaceable Schools Program. This program applies to Grades PK – 8.

Reporting bullying incidences is not only the responsibility of those who are victimized but also anyone who witnesses the behavior.

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CELL PHONES AND BEEPERS

Students in Grades 1 – 6 may not use or be in possession of a cell phone or beeper. For students in Grades 7 – 8 the use of cell phones and beepers is forbidden:

- a. in the school building at all times
- b. during the school day, i.e. from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

The ringing of the phone, the beeping of the beeper, or any type of messaging, even if silent, is prohibited. If there is any infraction of this rule, it is required that the student be sent to the Dean. The student will automatically receive a detention for the first offense. In addition, said electronic item will be confiscated and will not be returned until the Dean deems appropriate.

Drivers are not to use cell phones in the carpool areas when dropping off or picking up children.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The *Saint Agnes Academy-Saint Dominic School Code of Conduct* reflects our mission to educate young people in a principle-based program. All teachers in the Saint Agnes-Saint Dominic community will aid students in developing behaviors based on the Code of Conduct. Saint Agnes Academy- Saint Dominic School adheres to an Honor Code. In addition, we expect each student to:

1. Respect all individuals and both school and personal property
2. Obey classroom rules
3. Keep hands, feet, and objects to herself/himself.
4. Refrain from hurtful or vulgar language and obscene gestures
5. Come dressed according to the guidelines set by the school
6. Report to class on time with all designated materials

All students who attend St. Agnes Academy-St. Dominic School are to conduct themselves in accordance with the Code of Conduct at all extra-curricular activities and activities sponsored by the school. Conduct outside of school that reflects unfavorably on the school may result in appropriate disciplinary action.

Merits

A merit system will recognize those students who exemplify the Code of Conduct. Rewards may include positive notes to parents/students, casual or dress-down days, award ribbons and certificates, extra privileges, etc.

Quarterly and yearly awards are presented to students who demonstrate outstanding conduct in grades 1-8.

Consequences

1. Students will be subject to consequences established by their classroom teachers.
2. Demerits may be issued by any faculty member for violations of the Code of Conduct.
3. Upon receipt of a third demerit, students may receive a detention.
4. Upon receipt of a third detention, students may be referred to the Faculty Advisory Committee to determine further consequences.
5. ***Severe Clause:*** A detention may be issued at the discretion of the Dean and/or teacher for serious infractions such as insubordination, stealing, or repeated disregard of behavior standards.

6. **Detention:** After school detention may be necessary for discipline in grades 1-8. The Dean and faculty determine detention times.

COMMUNICATION

1. Our school website, saa-sds.org, is the primary communication tool for the St. Agnes Academy-St. Dominic School community.
2. Email for all faculty and staff consists of the first initial of the first name, the last name, followed by @saa-sds.org. Example: jmurphy@saa-sds.org for the SDS Dean.
3. PowerSchool is our personal information system and is accessible on the web. PowerSchool provides all information about grades and progress for students in Grades 1 – 12. Passwords are distributed at the start of each school year and parents are advised to check their child's grades often.
4. The St. Agnes Academy-St. Dominic School PK – 8 home-school communication tool is the *Wednesday Wire*. The *Wednesday Wire* is posted on our school website every Wednesday.

CURRICULUM

Religion

The goal of the Religion Program is to foster in the students an awareness of and sensitivity to God's presence in their lives. Since this presence of God is recognized generally through interaction with others in daily life, the students are provided with a community, which is striving, to live Christ's ministry as found in the Gospels. Such witness is encouraged through daily prayer, the study of the Sacred Scriptures, Church history and doctrine, and service to others. Respect for the religious preferences of all students is fostered and encouraged.

Language Arts

Students participate in a developmental reading program, which gradually intensifies the application of phonetic skills. The program is designed to foster an appreciation and enjoyment of reading throughout life. The study of spelling, vocabulary development, English grammar and composition equips the students to express ideas logically, with clarity, force and originality, in both written and oral form. The literature program emphasizes the integration of reading, writing, speaking, listening, and learning of research and study skills in meaningful contexts. The Language Arts Program also includes instruction and practice in full utilization of the library.

Mathematics

The Mathematics Program combines the understanding of basic mathematical principles and concepts with the traditional drill in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Algebra is offered at the eighth grade level. Placement in algebra is based on the results of the Orleans-Hanna Algebra Prognosis Test, achievement tests, and academic performance. Placement in Algebra 1 is based on the Orleans-Hanna Algebra Prognosis Test, achievement tests, academic performance and teacher recommendation

Science

By observing, inquiring, planning, predicting and experimenting, students develop reasoning powers while learning to understand the world in which they live. Both the physical and biological sciences are taught within a curriculum appropriate to each grade level. Laboratory experience is available at every grade level.

Social Studies

In a spirit of inquiry, the Social Studies curriculum introduces community relationships and civic responsibilities. It teaches geography and history of the regions of the world with emphasis on the United States. Fourth grade students make a special study of the history of the State of Tennessee.

Foreign Language

A survey of languages is taught in PK – SK. Spanish is offered in grades 1 – 6. The Spanish curriculum emphasizes speaking and listening skills, provides opportunities for reading and writing the language, and includes a study of the Spanish culture. Latin I is offered in grade 8 to develop and increase vocabulary, reinforce the study of grammar, familiarize students with ancient history, and prepare them for studying foreign languages in high school. Students who attend the Upper School may enroll in Latin II as freshmen upon successful completion this course.

FINE ARTS:

Visual Arts

Through the experiences of drawing, painting, graphic design, printmaking, woodworking, sculpture, and weaving, the student develops an appreciation for and instruction in the basics of color, line, value, shape, space, texture and form. There is ample opportunity to put studio experience to practical use in the classroom.

Drama

The purpose of the Drama Program is to provide fifth through eighth grade students with an opportunity to participate in theatrical productions and to develop an appreciation of live drama.

Music

The Music Program is designed to develop basic music concepts and skills. These musical concepts are reinforced through hearing, singing, and playing songs and selections ranging from traditional to contemporary. Musical skill development is in the areas of listening, reading, and performing. Participation in the Choral Program is optional for students in grades four through six. Students may also participate in the Liturgical Choir and the St. Dominic School Boys' Choir.

Physical Education

The objective of the Physical Education Program is to develop fitness based on physical capabilities with self-confidence, self-discipline, and self-control as goals. All students are expected to participate in physical education classes. As part of physical training, the students receive instruction in soccer, volleyball, basketball, gymnastics, aerobics, badminton, folk and modern dance, softball, and track and field. The entire program is designed to develop agility, coordination, and endurance, as well as to instill general health knowledge.

DINING HALL PROTOCOL

Lunch periods are a pleasant time to gather for food and fellowship. To make the lunch periods pleasant and relaxing, the following courtesies should be observed:

1. Good table manners are expected of every student
2. Students should not be wasteful of food
3. The tables are to be left clean, and all trash is to be put in the proper place
4. No more than eight chairs are to be at each table
5. Students must clean up after themselves
6. **No food drink may be taken from the Dining Hall**
7. Students must be polite and speak in a conversational tone

Table cleaners will be assigned for each grade level on a rotating basis.

DISMISSAL

Dismissal procedures are designed to ensure the safety of all children and must be followed at all times.

ALL students in PK- 8 who are not picked up by the end of dismissal need to be under adult supervision. After school care services are as follows:

1. Extended Day Activities (EDA): Parents may register for this program or pay a drop-in fee when needed. EDA closes at 6 p.m. Contact Jennifer Hanson at 435-5843 for information about this service.
2. Students in Grades 1 – 6 who remain beyond the stated dismissal times will be escorted to EDA which is located in the Dining Hall. A drop-in fee is assessed for this.
3. Students who remain after dismissal for a school-sponsored activity will report to EDA. A fee is assessed for this after-care service.
4. Junior High students who remain after dismissal must report to EDA in the Dining Hall to check-in. No fee is charged for Junior High students who need a place to go after school.

Carpool Numbers and Cards

To ensure a smooth flow of traffic, all families will be issued either a carpool number or a car pool card.

Grades PK-6: Car pool *numbers* are issued on Registration Day and **MUST BE ATTACHED** to the **right-hand visor** or in the **top right corner of the windshield**.

Junior High: Carpool *cards* labeled “JH” are issued to all JH families on Registration Day and **MUST BE ATTACHED** to the **right-hand visor** or in the **top right corner of the windshield**.

Carpool numbers must be visible at all times during dismissal.

Cell Phones

Drivers are ***not to use cell phones in the carpool areas*** when dropping off or picking up children.

Locations for Dismissal

Locations for dismissal are as follows:

1. Early Childhood Building PK-SK ***only***
2. St. Dominic front patio SDS Grades 1 – 6 and siblings
3. St. Agnes front patio SAA Grades 1 – 6 and siblings
4. Research Center front patio Junior High ***only***
As you enter the gate by the Research Center, stay in the LEFT lane that is designated for the Junior High pick-up.

Students are NOT to be picked up in any other areas of the school such as, at Siena Hall, unless prior arrangements are made with the appropriate Dean. Students who do not have a Dean's permission to be picked up in a place other than the four approved areas will be directed by the adults on duty to go to their designated pick up area.

Maps for Dismissal

Dismissal maps are printed on the back of each carpool number and carpool card. Maps are also located on our school website.

Parking at Dismissal

If a parent/guardian wishes to come into the building to pick up their child they ***must park in a designated VISITOR space, NOT along the CURBS.***

Parking in a fire lane is prohibited at all times.

The Lower School Counselors provide individual as well as group academic, emotional, and social support to students. The counselors also conduct classroom lessons dealing with conflict resolution, peer pressure, self-esteem, and lessons on study skills.

HONOR CODE

In keeping with our philosophy and mission statement which demands absolute honesty to one’s self and to others, thereby creating an atmosphere of mutual trust and respect in all campus situations, Saint Agnes Academy –Saint Dominic School has established an Honor System as a means of achieving this ideal. The success of the Honor System is directly proportionate to each person’s commitment to this ideal.

All students are expected to abide by their pledges to the system. Lying, cheating and stealing are all infractions of the Honor System and will be treated as serious offenses.

Cheating is defined as taking credit for work other than your own (including blatant plagiarism) or assisting another in deception such as, permitting another student to copy your homework. All incidences of cheating will be reported to the Dean. Students who have more than two cheating offences will appear before the Faculty Advisory Committee for disciplinary action.

Consequences for Honor Code violations may include the following:

1. automatic detention
2. ineligibility for Honor Roll during the grading period of the infraction
3. verbal and written notification to parents
4. conference with Dean to be placed in student’s discipline file
5. a “U” in conduct
6. In-school or home suspension

Students will be instructed about the Honor System at the beginning of each year. Students in Grades 5- 8 will be expected to sign the Honor Pledge on all class quizzes, tests, and papers/projects.

The Honor Pledge is: *VERITAS - I pledge, on my honor that I have neither given nor received information on this assignment.*

Each quarter, students in Grades 6 – 8 are recognized for their academic performance based on the following criteria:

LAPTOPS

TOP TEN LAPTOP RULES ARE:

1. No unattended laptops.
2. No laptops in the Dining Hall
3. No laptop bag without an ID.
4. No laptops left in cars.
5. No loaner provided for issued laptops left at home.
6. No markings or stickers on the laptop itself.
7. No inappropriate screen savers and/or backgrounds
8. No inappropriate e-mails and no games.
9. No online chatting via chat, AIM, IRC, Jabber or any other chat program.
10. No rough handling of laptops.

LEARNING SPECIALIST

The St. Agnes Academy-St. Dominic School Learning Specialist provides supportive services for students with diagnosed learning differences. Students must have an Educational Evaluation from a licensed psychologist on file with the school in order to be referred to the Learning Specialist.

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MAKE-UP WORK

The responsibility of work missed during an excused absence rests solely with the student. Short-term absences do not relieve the students of their responsibility for completed assignments and test preparation when they return. Unless the teachers approve an extension, work/tests that are assigned prior to a student's absence must be completed on the assigned date.

Students are required to make up all work upon their return from being absent. Upon returning, students will be allowed one day per day of absence to make up work. For example, if a student misses a Friday and returns on Monday, **ALL** work is to be made up by Tuesday. When students return to class after having missed a test, they must be prepared to conform to the teacher's requirements regarding test make-up. Tests, homework, quizzes, and papers not made up in accordance with school policy may result in a grade of zero.

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PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION POLICY

Saint Agnes Academy – Saint Dominic School adheres to the guidelines that were developed by the Tennessee State Department of Education, the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee and School

Health, and the Memphis and Shelby County Health Department for both public and private schools, and the Tennessee Board of Nursing approved us. The intent of the policy is to assure safe administration of medications and to help each child maintain an optimal state of health. Guidelines are mailed before the beginning of the school year to every SAA-SDS family and are available from each Dean and the fulltime School Nurse.

An Authorization for Medication During School Hours Form must be completed yearly by a parent or guardian for administration during school hours of both prescribed and non-prescribed medications. A physician's signature is required on this form when prescription medication is needed. Exchanging prescription drugs may result in serious consequences including appearing before the Faculty Advisory Committee, suspension, and expulsion.

PROMOTION POLICY

A student who fails mathematics **or** English must repeat the failed course during the summer. Promotion to the next grade is contingent upon summer school record. A student who fails math **and** English may not be promoted to the next grade. In order to be promoted unconditionally, students must have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0.

Class rank is calculated using grades from the 7th and 8th grades.

SERVICE HOURS

All 7th and 8th grade students will be required to perform at least 15 hours of service per year for a maximum of thirty hours. The purpose of community service is to help students become aware of their Christian responsibility, to make them aware of the needs of others, to help them develop an appreciation for service to others, and to introduce them to the types of community services in our community and to the people who provide such services. Students are required to provide verification of the hours they serve. The religion department keeps service hours. **Awards are presented annually to students who perform outstanding service; the religion teacher presents these awards.**
